2006 Annual Report of the Town of Dover Police Department

The following is a statistical report on the activities of the Town of Dover Police Department. For the year 2006 the department answered 34,323 calls for service as compared to 34,160 for the year 2005. This figure represents an increase in calls for services, and also reflects that our calls for service have increased consistently over the past four years. We have been able to provide quality service, quickly and effectively to the community. However, in order for us to maintain this level of service we need to bring the force back to the full strength of 37 officers. Currently we are under our full strength of 37 by four officers; this is due to retirements and transfers. I am grateful to all the officers for banding together to pick up the slack and of the pride that motivates them to perform their duties in the face of this adversity so that the citizens that they serve are provided with the best law enforcement services available.

In quoting Edmund Burke, "The only thing necessary for the triumph of evil is for good men to do nothing". I would like to thank and commend all the members of the department for their efforts to prevent his from occurring. I am confident that their hard work will contribute to the future successes of the department.

The following is a brief summary of facts and statistics regarding the police department, as well as a brief summary of the accomplishments and changes within the department for the 2006 calendar year.

In 2006 the department responded to 34,323 calls for service. Each time a call for assistance is received an incident number is generated and a officer is dispatched. Each of these 34, 323 incidents was assigned to an officer for some type of action or department activity.

Note: Juvenile arrests listed above do not reflect incidents where the juvenile was not placed "into the system." One example of this would be when a juvenile is transported home and his parents were advised of his activity which brought him or her to the attention of the police department. This type of action is referred to as a "stationhouse or curbside adjustment" These actions are not considered arrests.

## **Police Department Breakdown**

Located within the Police Department are the offices for the Chief of Police, the Investigative Function, the Patrol Function, the respective function Commanders, the Records section, Cell Block for prisoners, Evidence Room and property storage area, Conference Room, Locker Room, Squad Room and Processing Area, in compliance with the New Jersey State Police Guidelines.

## **Personnel**

### **Regular Sworn Personnel**

The Town of Dover Police Department is currently staffed by 33 officers. The remainder of the staff consists of two full time dispatchers, one part time dispatcher, two records section clerks and one executive secretary.

### **Dispatchers**

The Town of Dover Police Department currently employs two full time dispatchers, and one part time dispatcher, who operate our Police Communications and Dispatch Center. They are responsible for answering all phone calls for the police department. The communications operators also answer phone calls requesting Fire and Emergency Medical Service response. Each call for service is entered into the Computer Aided Dispatch System (Cplims). The department maintains a full time and full service NCIC CJIS which is available 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. This system allows for the 24 hour exchange of information with every law enforcement and Homeland Security agency in the United States of America, Puerto Rico and Canada.

### **Parking Authority Officers**

We employ one full time and one part time parking enforcement officers. These officers are responsible to monitor and enforce the parking ordinances in the main business district of the town, in addition to regulating the metered parking areas. They also perform maintenance on the meters along with collection of the fees from these meters.

### **Records Room**

The Town of Dover Police Department employs two full time clerks to staff the records section. Records are destroyed periodically in accordance with the New Jersey statute on record archive and destruction schedule. These clerks also provide the public with copies of records as required and carry out the discovery process for court cases.

### **Police Department Administrative Assistant**

We employ one full time secretary to conduct the business of the police department with regards to fingerprint reporting, firearms records, taxi and alcohol licensing.

### **Matrons**

We currently use Special Officer Joan Smith to conduct our matron services for female prisoners.

### **Crossing Guards**

We employ 12 crossing guards to maintain our school crossing posts. The department is always in need of alternate guards to replace guards who have taken time off.

## **Police Department Functions**

### **Police Functions**

The police department performs various specialized functions, in addition to the Patrol and Investigative Functions, the following also exist. Community Policing, Traffic, Abandoned Vehicle Abatement Program, Fatal Accident Investigation Unit, Motorcycle, Bicycle Units, DWI Enforcement.

### **Community Policing**

Community Policing is a philosophy that crime and quality of life issues can be solved by a teamwork approach by ALL levels of government. This philosophy involves “creative” problem solving. The community policing philosophy stresses that all segments of the population have the ability to assist in the solving of problems and quality of life issues. All facets of town government should be used to address problems that impact the quality of life for the citizens of the Town of Dover.

Each and every officer of the Dover Police Department practices the philosophy of Community Policing. It is our goal to meet the communities’ expectations through constant communication and feed back with the citizens. This is consistent with our goals and mission statement and is evidenced in the many avenues that we provide for contact with the community; one example would be our interactive web site.

### **Neighborhood Watch**

This year we ran several successful information sessions and participated in the National Night Out Program. Neighborhood Watch (or Crime Watch) is a civilian organization that is provided assistance and information from the police department. Once the interest from the community was obtained, the department provided officers to assist in the development of this valuable program. Each of the patrol sergeants was assigned a specific ward to address community related problems. While this program is still in the beginning phases it has already provided assistance to the department in many investigations.

### **Traffic**

Our traffic specialists continually monitor traffic patterns and accident trends to provide better enforcement and safety to the residents. We have a fully trained Fatal Accident Unit which investigates all fatal and serious motor vehicle accidents to determine the cause and formulate a plan of action to prevent further accidents of this magnitude. In addition, our officers monitor the abandoned vehicles in the town to remove them when the need arises.

### **Investigative Function / Detective Bureau**

The Detective Bureau is staffed by four detectives, the school resource officer, one sergeant and a captain. The sergeant has immediate supervision of the detectives and assigns the caseload to each detective. The sergeant tracks the investigations and also investigates cases. The captain has overall command of the detective bureau along with other administrative duties, such as Internal Affairs Investigations, Liquor License Investigations and Firearms Applicant Investigations. The primary function of the detectives is to investigate all reported crimes, such as burglaries, thefts, sexual assaults, frauds, aggravated assaults and other serious crimes. The detectives also conduct narcotic investigations and surveillances along with initiating investigations on their own. The Detective Bureau works closely with other law enforcement agencies within the county and state. Included in their responsibilities is the weekly fingerprinting of citizen applicants for employment, immigration and firearms purposes.

### **Police Department Firearms**

The current assigned service weapon for the police department is the Glock 40 caliber pistol. The department also owns ten Remington 870 Pump Shotguns and two Heckler & Koch MP5 Sub-machineguns as well as other special weapons.

### **Internal Affairs Investigations**

During the 2006 calendar year there were 7 internal affairs related complaints from citizens. Some of these resulted in disciplinary action against the officers involved while others proved that the officers acted appropriately and within department standards and policy.

### **Patrol Function / Patrol Operations**

The patrol function consists of four patrol squads with an assigned strength of five officers each. Currently, we can not maintain this level as staffing for the department has been a concern. Each of these squads is under the command of a sergeant. There is one lieutenant in the patrol operations function and the section is commanded by a captain. Patrol officers respond to all calls for service and patrols are operated 24 hours a day 365 days a year. Patrol officers are cross trained in various law enforcement disciplines. Officers in patrol have varying degrees of training and abilities. There are several officers who speak Spanish and have other qualifications such as sign language just to name a few.

### **Traffic Enforcement**

The members of patrol are committed to the reduction of motor vehicle accidents. This is done by the enforcement of traffic laws. Each officer is provided with written warning books, officers are encouraged to enforce traffic laws and take the necessary enforcement actions using any of the methods available. The use of these warnings provides the department with the capability of addressing these violations without the monetary penalty. These warnings are entered into the various computer systems which are searched by officers conducting motor vehicle stops. In this way repeated or habitual violators can be identified. Naturally, these warnings are not intended to replace the issuance of summonses but they allow the officers the ability to properly address situations using their discretion based on the circumstances.

### Radar Operations

All primary patrol units maintained by the department are equipped with a K55 Radar unit. Officers in patrol operate radar daily as part of their normal duties. Radar is used to enforce speeding violations throughout the Town of Dover. Officers target areas for radar surveillance based on various criteria, including but not limited to the following: Accident Statistics, Traffic Volume and Traffic Counts. The department also maintains a Radar Speed Warning Sign and Traffic Counter. Each of these are placed at various locations and used as needed and warranted based on information obtained by the department. The Traffic Counter is used to provide the department with the "real picture", as it is hardly visible to the average motorist. It is placed in various locations for a period of time, usually one week, the data is then downloaded to a computer and various calculations are done. This system provides a comprehensive report which can be used to target traffic at the appropriate times.

### Motorcycle Patrols

Currently we utilize a motorcycle as part of our patrol fleet. The motorcycle offers several unique benefits to enforcement and community involvement to the department.

### **Bicycles**

We have four police equipped bicycles to be utilized by officers trained in their operation to patrol and provide an avenue for the citizens to approach officers in a one on one setting. Bicycles Patrol is open to all officers once properly equipped and properly trained by Officer Aldo Cicchetti.

### **School Involvement**

Our staff participates with all the schools in the district in education and information programs designed for the youth of our community. One such program is Healthy Tiger which utilizes officers in the schools to present a program of information to the youth.

### **School Resource Officer**

Starting in the 2006 calendar year the department in cooperation with the Dover Board of Education has assigned Officer Keith Smith to the school system as a School Resource Officer. Officer Smith has proven to be an asset within the school system, he has successfully diverted many situations from rising to major incidents.

### **False Alarm Activity / Enforcement**

In 2003 the department began to implement a False Alarm Reduction program. This program consists of monitoring the police responses to burglar alarms. When false alarms are noted warning letters are sent. After a prescribed number of false alarm responses, local ordinance violations are issued.

In 2006 the department detected 38 locations that had more than 4 alarms during the year. This totaled 867 police responses. There were 54 new alarm systems registered. Warning letters were sent to locations having 4 or more alarms in the calendar year.

### **Performance Based Evaluation**

We continue to use a performance based evaluation program. This program sets various standards for the officers to meet. The officers are then evaluated on these sets of standards. All of the standards are based on performance; officers who perform their duties well, do very well in the evaluation. Officers who perform poorly do not obtain a good evaluation and are provided with feedback so they can address their deficiencies.

## **Equipment**

### **Mobile Data Computers**

Each patrol unit in the department now has the capability to access the state criminal justice databases, which until now, were only available in headquarters. Each officer while on patrol can now conduct these checks without the assistance of headquarters. In 2006 the department implemented of a barcode reader system that will read the barcode on the New Jersey Driver's License. This assists the dispatchers as they now have their work load reduced while increasing the number of searches that can be performed by the officers on patrol.

The upgrades to the systems now allow officers on patrol to connect to the department internal network. They have all the same abilities in the patrol units as they would at a terminal in police headquarters. For the 2006 calendar year there were 37,936 license plate checks conducted using this system. This does not include checks done using the dispatchers.

### **Computer Aided Dispatch System**

Located within the police department are several computer systems which are interfaced with each other. Cplims is the department computerized records management system. Cplims is a text based records management system with operates on a central Unix based server. Cplims is the cornerstone of the department's records management system. The department also maintains a Windows 2000 computer network with both internal and external email systems for the officers to use. The department also has a redundant server system which allows for fault tolerance and quick recovery in the event of failure. All reports prepared by the officers of the department are computer generated. These two systems also interface with the computer systems in the patrol units.

### **Live Scan Fingerprint System**

Located within the police department we also have a Live Scan Fingerprint System. This system allows for the immediate submission of fingerprints to the New Jersey State Police and Federal Bureau of Investigation. This system also has the ability to run checks on persons arrested or a suspect who's identity is in question. Responses are returned within 20 minutes in most cases. As part of this system digital mug shots are also taken and submitted to a statewide database maintained by the New Jersey State Police. Dover was the first municipal police department in the state to have this system installed for use.

### **Automatic External Defibrillators**

The department has obtained 9 automatic external defibrillators. These units have been placed into all active patrol units and one is maintained in headquarters.

### **Equipment Issued to Officers**

Each officer of the Town of Dover Police Department is issued the following equipment:

6. Reflective Traffic Vest
